Some Useful financial info:

More than £126.5 million disability benefits went unclaimed by people with a terminal cancer diagnosis in the UK. Expenses usually increase with illness, at the very time when income, energy and resources decrease. Yet many people affected by cancer who are in financial distress could be entitled to welfare benefits that would increase their weekly income and improve their quality of life. This problem can be easily resolved; money is there, waiting to be claimed.

Disability Living Allowance (DLA):

DLA is a contribution tothe extra costs incurred by people with disabilities. People living with cancer may be entitled to claim the benefits if they have had difficulties looking after themselves (DLA care component) and/or with walking (DLA mobility component). People with a terminal cancer diagnosis are often automatically entitled to the higher rate of the DLA care component under the Special Rules, which is worth £58.50 a week. They

might also be entitled to the DLA mobility component, at either the lower or higher rate, if they have trouble walking - but their terminal diagnosis does not make them automatically eligible. DLA is not means-tested (income and savings are not taken into account) and can be claimed by anyone regardless of their household income or employment status. Those awarded DLA may also become eligible for extra benefit, such as income support.

Attendance Allowance - (AA):

AA is a similar benefit to DLA but for people aged 65 and over. It is not meanstested. Unlike DLA, it does not have a mobility component, but people may be entitled to AA if they have care needs or are terminally ill.

Special Rules:

Anyone who has been given a terminal cancer diagnosis with a life expectancy of less than six months automatically qualifies for higher rate DLA for their care needs or higher rate AA. Claims made under the Special Rules for terminal illness should be processed much quicker than ordinary claims.

Macmillan Cancer Relief provide a special telephone helpline for patients and their carers who need benefits advice. To talk to them in confidence and receive advice call them on: 0800 500 800.

New Clinic for Men with prostate cancer

The uro-oncolgy Nurses at the NNUH; Sallie, Claire and Wendy, have recently begun a regular outpatient clinic to see men diagnosed with prostate cancer. The aim of the clinic is to see men in an unhurried manner who need to be monitored at the hospital by specialists, but have stable disease, so do not need to see a doctor. The aim is to provide a quality, accessible service at the same time freeing medical staff time.

The Clinic Protocols:

The aims of the nurse-led clinic are:

- ·To provide continuity of care for patients and their families.
- ·Longer appointments to facilitate better communication.
- ·To provide continuous, consistent, communication and information.
- To enable those patients that need additional social and psychological support to be seen in an informal and unhurried environment.
- ·To aid accurate patient assessment, audit and data gathering.
- ·To reduce the burden of follow-up appointments in consultant led clinics.

Broad Recommendations:

The Uro-Oncology Nurse Specialists will manage the clinic according to an agreed protocol, recognising the extent and limitations of their expertise.

Patient criteria

- ·Men who have had a Radical Prostatectomy
- ·Men who have received Radical Radiotherapy to the prostate
- ·Men receiving Hormone Deprivation Therapy with a stable PSA and stable symptoms, but are at high risk of early progression. Men receiving Intermittent

Hormone Deprivation Ther-

·The worried well men, this should be viewed as a half way measure, with the aim of eventual discharge to the care of the GP.

Referral to the clinic can be made by a:

- ·Consultant Urologist
- Consultant Oncologist
- ·Staff Grade
- Specialist Registrar
- ·Urology Nurse Practitioner
- ·Continence Advisors.

Patient Assessment:

- General well being both physical and psychological Understanding of condition and treatment.
- ·Side-effects of treatment ·Potency. If this is a cause of dissatisfaction. Has any treatment been tried? Was it effective? Would the patient like to try treatmer Advice to GP or andro. as appropriate.
- ·Urinary symptoms. Is this a cause of dissatisfaction? Has it been investigated? Have any treatments been tried? Investigate as needed. Advice to GP or refer to urology consultant or continence advisors as appropriate.

Examination & investigations:

- PSA prior to appointment As required
- ·Biochemical/haematological evaluation
- ·Flow rate/ultra -sound
- · Urinalysis
- ·Radiology

Referral back to Consultant:

- ·Significant or consecutive rises in PSA
- ·Abnormal biochemical or haematological results
- ·Skeletal pain
- ·Persistent urinary symptoms despite trail of medication
- ·Ongoing bowel problems post radiotherapy.
